JUDGMENT

This is the final judgment in this suit wherein the claim before the court, dated and filed on the 19th of May 2023 is for:

An order of this Court compelling the defendant to pay the Claimant, the sum of N1,680,000 representing cost for 30 Units of galvanized sheet at N56,000 per unit that was supplied by the Claimant to the defendant but was never paid for, by the defendant.

In proof of their case, the Claimant called one witness and the defendant never appeared in this matter.

On the 28th day of July, 2023, an application to enter plea of not liable for the Claimant was granted and the matter was set down for hearing.

On the 9th of August, 2023, the Claimant was represented by her manager, Mercy Ogoro and the defendant was also absent. On this date, the CW1, Mercy Ogoro stated that the Claimant supplied goods to the defendant on the 24th December, 2019. That it was 30 pieces of galvanized sheets and they have not been paid. The CW1 identifies the waybill and the LPO and the invoice, the supply sheet and the demand letter.

The Claimant Counsel seeks to tender same in evidence and the invoice, the waybill/delivery note, the demand letter was admitted in evidence and were admitted as Exhibits A, B1 & B2 and Exhibits C respectively.

In conclusion, the CW1 stated that she wants the Court to grant their claim as on the face of the claim before the Court.

At the end of the evidence of CW1, the defendant is foreclosed from cross examining the CW1 and from defence and the matter was adjourned for judgment



That said, I will proceed to consider the case of the parties in the light of the relevant laws. I have noted the essence of the claim have also taken cognizance of the evidence before the court. I have couched a lone issue for determination and that is whether the Claimant has discharged the burden of proving his claim before the Court.

Suffice is to say that before the court adjourned the matter for hearing and heard the matter, the court always satisfied itself that:

1. The processes have been duly served on the defendant
2. That the time before the date of service and the date of hearing was sufficient for the defendant to have appeared had he intended to do so.

It is also important to note at this point that none of the facts stated by the Claimant's witness above was controverted in evidence or denied by the defendant and so will be deemed by this court as admitted. The law is that facts admitted need not be proved by evidence. Please refer to the case of Ayoke V. Bello (1992)10 NWLR (Pt 218) pg 380 Ratio 2; O.A.A Cooperative Society Vs. NACP Ltd (1999) 2NWLR (Pt 590) Pg 234, Ratio 4 to the effect that what is not denied is deemed admitted and what is admitted need not be proved.

On the undisputed and clear evidence before the court, the court will hold that the claimant has discharged the burden of proving that he is entitled to his claim before the Court.

IT IS THUS ADJUDGED that the Defendant to pay the Claimant the sum of N1,680,000 (One Million, Six Hundred and Eighty Thousand Naira) representing cost for 30 Units of galvanized sheet at N56,000 per unit that was supplied by the Claimant to the defendant but was never paid for, by the defendant.

AND IT IS ORDERED that the defendant to pay the Claimant, the aforesaid sum of N1,680,000 (One Million, Six Hundred and Eighty Thousand Naira) **with immediate effect**

AND IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the defendant do pay to the Registrar of this court the total sum of N1,680,000 (One Million, Six Hundred and Eighty Thousand Naira)

TAKE NOTICE –That if payment is not made as above ordered, a warrant or warrants may issue requiring an officer of the court to levy the sum above mentioned, to the Claimant together with further costs.
